In connection with the brain there is a great cable carrying many bundles of "live" wires, or nerves. This cable is the spinal cord. It is enclosed in a canal of twenty-four bones connected together by the muscles. From between these bones or vertebrae pass thirty-one pairs of spinal nerves. Some of these nerves go to the muscles and some by the way of the Sympathetic Nervous System to the different organs of the body. If a vertebrae should be slipped somewhat—even slightly—from its position so as to pinch on one of these nerves, perhaps irritating or possibly paralyzing it, the organ it supplies would then become either irritated or torpid. A disturbed rib or any other mischief at a joint—no matter how slight its degree—is thus liable to press on an important nerve or vessel and interfere with its action.
Then, how necessary it is to have this frame work in perfect adjustment!
