City Election Matters

The more the question is studied with reference to La Grande following the provisions of the primary nominating law the more apparent it is, that unless the political parties draw lines and nominate complete tickets it will be impossible to comply with it. Neither party contemplates such action. Then the next thing is to follow the law just as close as possible and that is the way suggested by the council, that is for the candidates to prepare their petitions and file them with the Recorder fifteen days prior to the election.

Another erroneous idea is abroad and that is that petitioners can sign as many petitions as they chose. They can only sign one candidate's petition for the same office.

Petitioners must secure at least three per cent of the vote cast at the last November election within the precincts over which they may have authority if elected.

Parties signing these petitions must be electors.

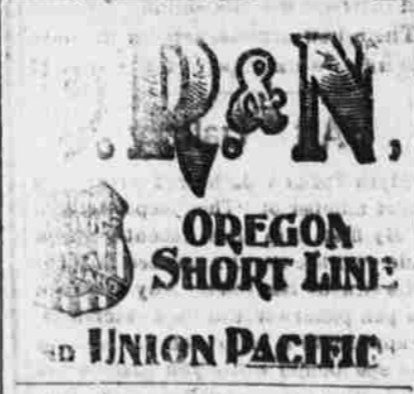
