MEBER TRIAL WITNESS

[By Scripps News Association]
Auburn Cal Feb 7th—The opening statement in the trial of Adolph Weber for the murder of his mother began yesterday, and the opening was made by Attorney General Webb, and, in speaking for the state he said that the evidence to be introduced by the prosecution would be wholly circumstantial, but that the links would connect him with the crime.
He said that the fact that Weber was the sole heir to fifty thousand dollars would be given as a motive for the murder. Weber's demeanor before and after the crime, the attorney stated, his cold and unaffected manner after the fire when he saw the bodies taken from the burning house, the finding of a bloodstained pistol with five empty chambers in it, and a comparison of the bullets used in the pistol and those found in the dead bodies, the attorney stated, would all be proven and go to form the links that would bind the criminal to his crime.
He also dwelt upon young Weber's threat against his aunt. Webb stated that the prosecution would be able to entirely disprove Weber's statement of the route taken by him on leaving home the night of the fire by more than one witness; that the prosecution would also prove that the defendant was seen in the American Hotel wash room a few moments after washing his hands, and that the water left was bloody. L F Warner, the county surveyor was the first witness called, and he identified the maps of the Weber premises.

Auburn Cal, Feb 7—The physician who performed the autopsies on the murdered Weber family testified this morning in the trial of Adolph Weber. He said that the pistol wounds in the bodies of Julius, Mary and Bertha Weber were almost instantly fatal in each case. One of the witnesses today told of his being called to dress the hand of the defendant on the night of the murder. Weber told this witness that he had cut his hand on a window pane, but stated also that it had not been made in that manner, but was a jagged wound as if torn by a barbed wire. He also made the startling announcement that Weber when remonstrated with on his determination to go back to the fire, said: "people say my mother is alive. I know she's dead. I know that they are all dead."

Statehood Bill

Washington Feb 7—The Senate today resumed consideration of the statehood bill amendment passed prohibiting the sale of liquor in Oklahoma for twenty years the amendment leaving it to a vote of the people. The Arizona and New Mexico question, combining the two territories as one state has been adopted.

Washington Feb 7—The adoption of the Foraker amendment means that Arizona will be given the opportunity she desires to reject statehood so long as offered only in connection with New Mexico.
[Later]The statehood bill has been amended so as to give a quarter of a million acres of public lands to the Oklahoma University, and the same amount to the Agricultural College. Polygamy is prohibited
