ROBBERS SECURE \$8000

LaGrande, Ore., Feb. 8.—Four crackmen last night dynamited the vault of the LaGrande bank and secured eight thousand dollars. The robbers picked the lock to the front door and blew the entire front of the safe out. They then gathered the coin up in a sack and made their escape on down the railroad track on a track velocipede to a point several miles below town where their horses were concealed. A posse is now in pursuit.

The Circuit Court

Suit was filed in the Circuit Court today J. H. and W. R. Hutchinson vs The Union R. & Company, G. W. Buckman and the First National Bank of Union, to foreclose 16 mortgage bonds in the sum of \$36,385.44 and the sum of \$3,000 attorney fees. Leroy Lomax is attorney for the plaintiff.

In the case of Mrs. Anna Oliver vs the city of La Grande to prevent the city from moving the fence back on C street, the plaintiffs as one allegation set up the statute of limitations, having enjoyed peaceful possession for more than ten years. Judge Eakin held that the statute did not apply in such cases.

In the case of the state vs Chas. Deany charged with the larceny of some quilts from the Blue Mountain House, the jury brought in a verdict of guilty and sentence will be passed Friday morning.

The court this afternoon is engaged in the case of J. D. McKennon vs R. W. Deal with reference to the ownership of a horse.

It is expected that there will be several indictments made public tomorrow.

Important Decision

Wm Ramsey who has been incarcerated in the county jail awaiting the act of the grand jury charged with obtaining money under fraudulent pretenses was declared by the judge a free man.

This is a case whereby the business world should be fully informed as they are liable to be taken at any time and have no redress. It is so fine a distinction that in the past innocent persons have been defrauded and we presume always will.

A party passing check on a bank wherein he has no funds can be punished but he can pass a sight draft on an individual and this is no crime. This is what Ramsey did. District attorney Lomax says for the protection of the commercial world he is going to appeal this case to the supreme court and if the decision is sustained he will try and have the legislature amend the present law and make such transactions a crime. Ramsey disposed of several sight drafts on his brother in Illinois but they were all returned unhonored.
