Last Night's Fire

Fire last evening destroyed the green house on Adams avenue, belonging to Wm Gilpin. The fire is supposed to have originated from the floor as when it was discovered the roof was in flames. Mr. and Mrs. Gilpin had left the green house and had left a fire in the stove which is used to keep the plants warm. The building was insured for one thousand dollars. The neighbors were able to save all the furniture. Had the fire department known where the fire was located they would have been able to have saved the building, but as the person who turned in the alarm failed to state and as the impression was given out that the fire was across the track the cars first started in the direction of the Star Grocery Store and after crossing the track failed to find a fire returned to the fire building and then made another start. La Grande certainly needs an alarm system of some sort which will enable the fire department to learn the location of the fire.

We Need It

The result of last night's fire shows plainly the needs of an alarm system. In this instance the cars were first taken from the building and taken to the Box plant market and returned to the house, the boys thinking it a false alarm, when the second alarm was turned. Had the department known at the first where the fire was the building could easily have been saved. The alarm turned in a few weeks ago when Joe Jones house was on fire, the department lost fully ten minutes before its location could be ascertained. It is hard work to pull the heavy carts at all times of the day and night and then to often find that when they arrive where the supposed fire is, it is elsewhere.
