It Pays to Patronize Home Institutions

C W Hunt, who purchased a number of cars of apples from several different growers, is reported to have turned his purchases down, owing to the fact that the San Francisco market went to pieces and he would have been loser to considerable extent.
It is the same old story o'er and o'er. An outsider comes in and puts up a strong talk and all kinds of promises and, if things come his way he bids to the strict letter of the contract, but if the markets go wrong he writes that he is unable to fulfill his part and in nine cases out of ten that ends it. Fruit growers should secure sufficient down on future sales to insure against a lower market than existing at the date of the contract.
A still better plan is to sell to home people who have their money invested in packing houses, are in business every month in the year and fulfill their contracts. We have such firms in this city and when they agree to pay a price they pay it, no matter whether the markets go up or down.

BAD STORM ON SOUND

Seattle, Wash., Feb. 10.—The storm here is the worse in years and no boat left port this morning. The steamer Diego broke from the dock and damaged a trestle; the steamer Golden City was rammed by a scow and badly damaged. Eight small sloops have been smashed to pieces, and one large scow loaded with shingles was sunk. Fifteen others have broken loose and are endangering the vessels in port. Two huge log booms have broken up and the city dock has been considerably damaged. The tugs are busy clearing the bay of debris. Similar reports are coming from the other sound ports.

Diplomatic Changes

Washington, Feb. 10.—Following the diplomatic changes which will be made by the President after the fourth day of March, Ambassador McCormick at St. Petersburg will be transferred to Paris to succeed Ambassador Porter. Ambassador Myer at Rome will go to St. Petersburg, and Henry White, Secretary of the London Embassy, will go to Rome. Henry L. Wilson, Minister to Chili, will be made minister to Belgium to succeed Lawrence Tomson who will resign.
