

Gen'l Grippenber Blames Kuropatkin

St Petersburg Feb 17—General Grippenber who arrived from Manchuria last night, confirms the report that he had relinquished his command after the recent attempt of the Russians to flank Oyama, because General Kuropatkin refused to send him help when victory was in sight, but instead, ordered him to withdraw. General Grippenber will make a personal report to the Czar. The enemies of General Kuropatkin are making the

most of Grippenber's report in order to force the former's removal from the Manchurian command. General Grippenber says that the flanking movement would have been entirely successful had not General Kuropatkin twice refused him reinforcements at critical moments. He says that he had one hundred thousand Japanese at his mercy, but was forced to withdraw by Kuropatkin who was overawed by the Japanese demonstration on his center.

Two More Deaths

Fierce Engagement
