Union County Murderer

Salem, Ore., Feb. 22—Governor Chamberlain today granted a full pardon to Wong Gee, a Chinaman serving a life sentence for murder committed in Union county in October, 1898. The pardon was granted at the request of Prince Kaag Yu Wei, secretary to the emperor of China who is touring this country on an inspection of its institutions. While going through the prison Wong Gee fell at the feet of his prince and begged forgiveness for his crime. The convict was taken to Portland today by two members of the prince's staff, who will send him to China.
