Hill Defeats Harriman

(By Scripps News Association)

Washington March 6—The supreme court today in the case of the Harriman interests and Northern Securities affirmed the circuit decision, allowing the distribution of the shares in the possession of the securities company of all the lines included in the company.

This is a final defeat for the Harriman interests and a victory for the Hill interests. The decision allows the desired prorata distribution. A motion filed by J. Hamilton Lewis to intervene on behalf of the Continental securities company was denied.

The decision was a surprise as it was not expected for several weeks.

Charles, assistant general passenger agent of the Northern Pacific has received advice that the transcontinental passenger association will convene at Portland June 5 for the spring meeting. From 90 to 100 general passenger agents and traffic managers of the more than two score railroads comprising the membership of the association will be present, and coming as it does at the beginning of the Lewis and Clark exposition the gathering is of exceptional importance. Noted Southerner Dead

Houston, Tex. March 6—John Henninger, one of the most noted men of the south during the Civil War, died peacefully at his home in Palestine this morning at the age of 87. He was first elected to congress in 1856 and remained until 1861, where he accepted the position of Postmaster-General in the confederate cabinet under Jefferson Davis, and was the only member of the cabinet who was captured with Davis and was confined for many months in Fort Warren. In 1874 he was returned to congress for a number of terms and in 1887 was elected to U. S. Senate and was author of the Cullom-Reagan interstate commerce bill. He was the last survivor of the Confederate cabinet.
