Geo. Ruckman is in the city today and states that he has 180 acres all ready to seed to sugar beets and will commence about the first of the month.

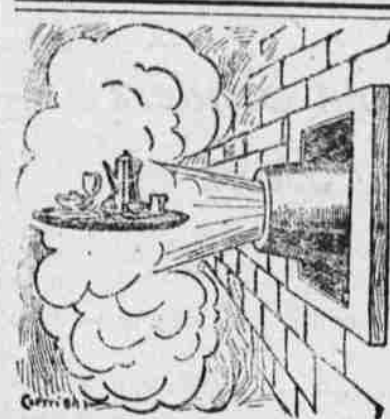
Mr Wm. Smith, proprietor of the Feed store on Fir street, is treating his business place to a new coat of paint, making it very attractive in appearance.

This has been an ideal winter for building at no time has there been a cessation of activities and the same conditions exist now as in the Fall, new houses are going up in all parts of the city and still there is a demand for empty houses.
