
Thanks to persistence, determination and perfect mastery of the subject on the part of Chairman Burton, the rivers and harbore appropriation bill is in safe harbor at last. But it was a fight to a finish in the House, delegation bitterly opposing it, with othe interests ready and only waiting an opportunity to kill the whole measure, and with an opposition alert, keen and hostile at all points ready for purposes of slaughter.

Beyond the slightest possibility of successful question being made, and without derogating is all but less than ten per cent in the least from the active and earnest support of the friends of the rivers and harbors bill; the winning of the contest is due to the intelligent fighting qualities of the Chairman of the committee, Burton, of Cleveland.
