D S Van Housen who is chief clerk of J E Fisher's hotel at Weiser came down last night and went out to spend the day with his brother.

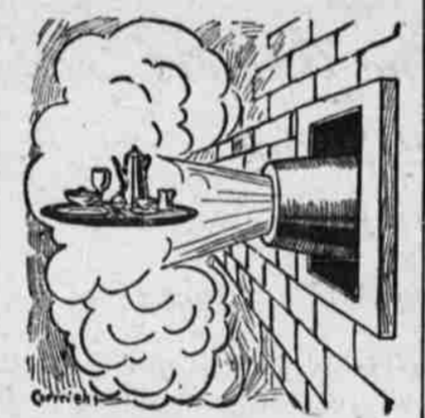
