## Coroner's Jury Finds That Ferguson Jumped

The coroner's jury which was called to inquire into the cause of the death of Wm Ferguson, brought in a verdict to the effect the said Wm Ferguson came to his death as a result of falling or jumping from west bound train last Saturday evening. This verdict was arrived at after listening to the evidence of the train crew and the switch crew and several who were thought to have known something of the accident. As a matter of fact very little is known regarding the sad affair other than that he was found by the switch engine which was following passenger train no 5 out of the yard. According to the evidence given by the switch crew they found the body on the track where it had evidently been run over by the passenger train. At

the time of its finding, though the body was completely cut in two at the base of the breast bone, there was still sufficient life left to allow the unfortunate man to gasp once for breath. The lower part of the trunk and the legs were found some ten or fifteen feet distant from the head and shoulders. The left foot and right hand were also severed from the body. The only witness who could throw any light upon the question of how he came to get under the train was James Joyce who was with him at the time he left the train. His statement regarding the accident was as follows. "I was standing on the platform of the passenger coach when Mr Ferguson also got on. He spoke to me and asked to borrow a dollar from me. I asked him if he had a ticket to take him to Perry and told him that if he had a ticket to Perry he did not need any money. He said that he wanted the dollar because he was going to get off the train and remain in La Grande for the night. The train was then in motion and was clipping along at a good speed and I cautioned him against attempting to get off. He took hold of the guard rail on the side of the car and let himself down until his foot reached the ground and then swung back to the platform. I thought that if I did not appear to look at him he would not make any more attempts to get off, and therefore I looked the other way for a moment and when I looked for him again he was gone". A young man who was also standing on the platform spoke up and said that that fellow jumped off the train head first. I guess he did for he was sure gone. There were several witnesses but the testimony of Mr Joyce was all that threw any light upon the accident. Joyce was questioned as to whether or not Ferguson was drunk and answered that he had what he would consider "just a sociable jag". The funeral took place yesterday afternoon about six o'clock.
