Millionaire in Jail

Seattle Wash March 17—Anton Stander, a millionaire Klondiker, and owner of the Stander hotel at Fourth avenue and Marion street was arrested at 2 o'clock this morning at the corner of First avenue and Madison street on the charge of being drunk and disorderly. Stander and his wife, who have had much trouble, were engaged in a quarrel and were using loud and boisterous language. Stander apparently was trying to get his wife home. She refused to go with him, telling officers that he was drunk and she feared him. Stander was trying to drag her up the hill when Patrolmen Ryan and Melvin arrived and placed him under arrest. Stander remained in jail until 10 o'clock this morning, when friends came to his rescue and put up \$200 bail to insure his appearance in court.

St. Patrick's Day.

Throughout Christendom, and especially in portions thereof in which people of Irish origin are found the seventeenth day of March is celebrated with social festivities and religious ceremonies, that day being generally regarded as the birthday of St. Patrick. He is regarded by the Irish Catholics as the Apostle of Ireland, and to him is accorded the honor of having introduced Christianity into Ireland. His history is filled with the rough romance of the age in which he lived. Born on a small farm in Scotland in about 387, he was captured by a band of Irish pirates when 16 years of age and carried to Ireland, and sold as a slave to a petty chieftain or planter in whose service he remained for six years when he escaped. Wandering as a fugitive slave with the constant dread of capture and return to servitude under an irate master, he reached France and became a Monk at Tours and thence to Lerins. In the year 431, he appeared before Pope Celestine, at Rome, who sent him to Ireland to preach. According to his Irish biographies he founded 305 churches in Ireland and baptized with his own hands 120,000 persons. He also ordained a vast number of priests and blessed many monks and nuns. The date of his death is uncertain. Some accounts made him 120 years old when he died and others 116. As it may, his life work was the establishment of Christianity in Ireland and for which he is honored at this day though he died some fourteen centuries ago.
