Another Orchard

Yesterday he received a shipment of over 12,000 trees to plant on his 240 acre fruit tract on the Sandridge. This when planted, which he will immediately proceed to do, will make 1/2 m 320 acres of apple orchard. For years it was thought that fruit could not be grown on the Sandridge, but that is a thing of the past and at the present increase of acreage in that section the Sandridge will soon be one of the fruit sections of the valley.
