Spokane March 20—To cover the badly burned body of a Lewiston woman, dozens of members of the Elk's lodge in Spokane will give patches of their outside. It is proposed to assemble the volunteers in bunches, give them chloroform and graft pieces of outside three inches long and three-quarters of an inch wide. The skin will be taken from the thigh, and three pieces will be the limit asked from each volunteer.

Seize Coal Mines

New York, March 19.—The Herald this morning prints the following dispatch from Port of Spain, Trinidad: News has reached Port of Spain that the governor of Barcelona, Venezuela has received from President Castro orders to take possession at once of the coal mines of Guantamaricola, situated near Barcelona, and leased in 1898 for 30 years by the Venezuelan government to an Italian company.

The same day the Venezuelan troops took possession of the mines by armed force, as in the similar case of the New York and Bermuda company, this notwithstanding the protest of the Italian manager. This action has been taken without a judgment of the court at Caracas.

The Italian legation has been notified and Baron Allotti, Italian charge d'affaires, is represented as having entered a protest.

British Pugilist

New York March 20.—The White Star steamer 'Adric, arrived today after the most turbulent voyage in her career, encountering waves sixty feet high. Among the passengers was Jacez White, the British pugilist and his manager Chas. Mitchell. White is matched to fight Jimmy Britt at San Francisco.

Many Victims

New York March 20.—Cerebro spinal meningitis which has been so prevalent in New York during the winter has claimed 386 lives since January 1. Most of the victims were children. The health commissioner says the disease cannot be traced to the source, its workings being so mysterious and its confined principally to the lower east side.

Trade Reviews

New York March 20.—Dun's Weekly Trade Review states improvement is noted in trade conditions generally and payments are more prompt, while railway earnings which have been falling behind in comparison with last year show a gain of 8.1 per cent last year. Manufacturing plants, especially in iron and steel, show great activity. Floods have done some damage in California, but farming prospects are most generally favorable.
