Many Skeletons

Chatcolet, Idaho, March 22.—Much interest has been aroused here and surrounding places by the recent finding of many human skeletons on a rocky point near here. The Oregon Railroad and Navigation Company's steam shovel, working at that place is responsible for the discovery, having turned them up while loading dirt and rock for filling bridges. Since then much speculation has been indulged in, and many theories advanced to account for their presence in that isolated locality, situated in a forest and remote from all permanent habitations. Some theorists believe that a battle must have been fought there many years ago by a number of Indian tribes and traders of the Hudson Bay company. Others shook their heads doubtfully and asserted that all the bones were surely those of Indians and attributed their death to natural causes.

A New Geyser

Butte, Mont., March 22.—A new geyser has made its appearance in Yellowstone National Park. It has been named "Skylrocket," on account of the peculiar appearance. It plays three times a week and spouts boiling water to an immense height. It is said to be the most beautiful geyser in the park. The initial discharge was witnessed by a troop of cavalry who were attracted by the terrible noise.

A WHALE IN SEATTLE HARBOR

Seattle, Washington March 22.—Moran Brothers' shipyard, where the battleship Nebraska is being placed in fighting shape, had an unusual visitor late Sunday evening in the shape of a huge sperm whale. The leviathan, which is one of the first seen in Puget sound in many years, swam in close to the slip, getting between it and the Nebraska, where the water is shallow.

The first known of its presence was when the watchman felt the ship rock from the impact of a noisy blow. He sent to investigate and was delayed by the shower of water thrown up by the whale in his efforts to turn around in the close quarters. During this struggle he struck the battleship's steel clad sides vicious blows, first with his head and then with his tail. The whale finally escaped, disappearing down the sound.

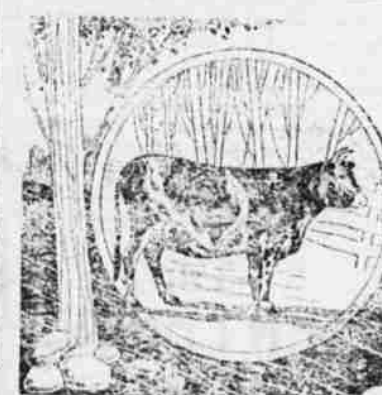
