OUT OF TUNE

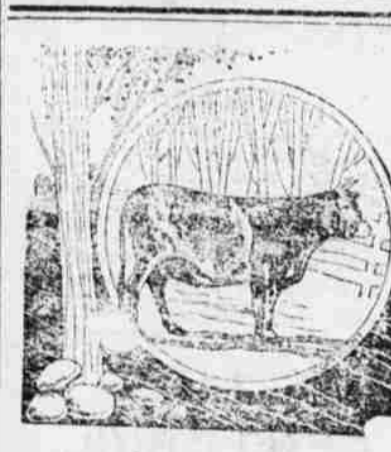
