Sunday Closing Fight

That the saloon men mean to fight the Sunday closing, was made apparent this afternoon at 1:30 o'clock when Attorney Rand appeared before Judge White and entered a plea of not guilty for all of them and their cases were continued until after the conclusion of the trial of Gus Hodgkiss, for unlawful cohabitation, which, according to ordinary calculations will be finished by Friday night, though it may go into Saturday.

It is understood that the first of these cases, which of themselves are said to exceed one hundred in number will be that against William Patterson.

Last night the crowd in town was augmented by the appearance of a dozen from Sumpter, one from Bourne and three from Huntington.

There were meetings and much debating. It is understood that the Baker City saloon men have one organization and those in the outside towns have another, and that they each have working committees to conduct the business with the attorneys, several having secured their own legal representatives before perfecting the organization.

From the present plans and indications the cases will be under way early next week and a summer business is in prospect.—Baker City Herald.

VENEZUELAN CASE STILL UNSETTLED

Washington, March 23.—The state department heard nothing from Minister Bowen yesterday to indicate that the Venezuela government has made answer to his last proposition to arbitrate the American claims and it is supposed that the answer, when it does come, will be to the effect that the Venezuelan government insists on awaiting the final action of its courts upon the pending asphalt case. It will then remain for the state department to determine how long it is prepared to await this judicial action.

The difficulty is that the Venezuelan government has refused the application of the asphalt company, supported by Minister Bowen, to revert to the status existing before the appointment of a receiver in the asphalt case and allow the company to re-possess itself of its property. As it is, the receiver in taking out large quantities of asphalt from Bermudez lake, the proceeds from which are going into the Venezuelan treasury, to the great financial loss of the company.

QUICK LAND SALES

Twin Falls City, March 23.—It required just an hour and 45 minutes for C. D. Thomas, special agent of the state land department, to sell at auction yesterday 3200 acres of state land lying seven to nine miles from this place, and that will be not farther than four miles from the railroad. The bidding was very spirited and in many cases spot cash payments were made.

The highest price paid was \$29 an acre and the lowest \$15, the average being \$21.50. The price for the water for this land is \$15 an acre, which makes the top price at the sale \$44 and the lowest \$30 an acre.

One bidder, W. H. Watts, of the Utah Construction company, representing himself and others, bought 1020 acres, and paid for it \$20,000 cash.

Doing Quick Work

The work of erecting the poles which will support the wires conducting the electric current from Cove to this city is progressing rapidly. Ten poles were set yesterday and the holes are dug, and poles placed nearby for setting for one mile and three quarters. The energy with which the manager of the line is pushing the work is commendable, and it will not be but a short time until the people of La Grande will be able to use the electric power generated at Cove. Another car load of poles for the line arrived yesterday, and this load contains enough poles to set two miles. The sub-station on Washington avenue will soon be completed, and the additional power added to that which the electric light and power company already have in this city.

Died

HANSEN.—In this city early Thursday morning, March 22, 1905, at the family home, Mrs. Jennie E., beloved wife of Henry Hansen, aged 56 years. Deceased was born in Missouri, later moved to Iowa and married Mr. Hansen in 1880. They came to this valley in 1892. About four months ago she was stricken with Bright's disease and despite all skill and kind administrations grew weaker and weaker.

The funeral will take place tomorrow at three o'clock from the Presbyterian church, the interment in the Masonic cemetery.

Syrians are Expelled

Port Au Prince, Haiti, March 23.—Public notice is made in Official Moniteur today that Syrian traders must settle their affairs, cease trading and leave the country by April 1. Their legations must designate the liquidators.

American Minister Powell, on being questioned, said that the interests of Syrians who have genuine American naturalization papers will be protected. The French, British and the Dominican legations will protect those under their jurisdiction.

Syrians who are Ottoman subjects, having vainly appealed for protection to the United States and French legations, will probably be expelled in a body. Those who remain under the protection of the several legations will be in danger from personal violence, as they are hated by the populace.
