Perform Last Rites

Palo Alto, March 24—The remains of Mrs. Leland Stanford were today consigned to their last resting place, beside those of her husband and son, in the mausoleum on the Stanford University grounds. Not in the history of California have greater honors been paid to the dead than was paid to this great philanthropist. There were hundreds, who had never seen the woman, coming from all parts of the state to pay their final respects. The funeral program, which was extensive, though simple, opened with the carrying of the casket containing the remains of Mrs. Stanford from the Stanford mansion to the great memorial chamber erected by the dead woman.

IMPRESSIVE COURTEGE

The cortege, though devoid of color, was solemnly impressive. The body of students led the procession, followed by the resident graduates, the choir, the alumni, the faculty officials, clergymen and honorary pallbearers. The hearse was guarded by eight of the athletic students association and the employees of the Stanford estate. As the mournful procession entered the chapel, Chopin's magnificent funeral march was rendered on a great organ. After the services were over, the procession reformed for their march to the mausoleum, where services, though brief, were again held. Three hymns were sung, followed by an eulogy and a beautiful ritual of committal, of the body to the tomb, which was performed by Bishop William Ford Nichols.
