Voodoo Murder

New York, March 25.—"King" Sour court, a negro of African descent, has been placed on trial under the charge made some months ago of killing a white child 20 months old, cables the Herald's Havana correspondent. The child's body was found at Guira de Melena, horribly mutilated, and with the heart removed. Charges were made that Sourcourt posed as a "voodoo" doctor, and that when an aged negro consulted him for treatment he advised her that the only remedy was to eat the heart of a white person. Kidnaping of the child victim is alleged to have followed. A dozen negroes were arrested on charges of being accessories to the crime.

Owing to the great fear in which the "voodoo" doctors are held, there has been difficulty thus far in obtaining testimony. The trial is attracting much interest in Havana.

Quarter Million Fire

Columbus, Ohio, March 25.—The fire which started last night and burned all night in this city destroyed the Columbus Dry Goods Co. store, and damaged the adjoining property. The total loss is estimated at a quarter of a million dollars.

Anarchists for Spain

Madrid, March 25.—The Government authorities have received word from New York police that two dangerous anarchists have embarked from that point, bound for Barcelona. The police at Barcelona have been instructed to keep a careful watch for them.

Unknown Man Dead

Spokane, March 25.—The body of a man, as yet unidentified, was found in north channel of the Spokane river, near the Centennial mill, about 9 o'clock yesterday morning by an employee of the mill, who reported the matter to the police.

Considerable difficulty was experienced in getting the body out of the river, as the place where it had caught against some driftwood is in the swiftest current of the river and the bottom is very treacherous. Alexander Turnbull, the undertaker who was called by Coroner Witter to take charge of the body, hired a man to wade out into the river and bring in the body.

Land Office Removal

Washington March 25.—President Roosevelt has signed an order directing the removal of the land office at Oregon City to Portland. The date of the removal is left to the discretion of the commissioner of the general land office who states that July 1 probably will be selected for the date of the change.

NO INFORMATION

Oregon City, March 25.—A. S. Dresser, register of the land office, when told yesterday afternoon of a Washington dispatch relative to the removal of the office to Portland, said: "I have received no official information that the office would be removed to Portland, but know that an inspector visiting here nine months ago recommended the change. A few days ago this office received a letter from the assistant land commissioner, saying that there was no room in the Portland postoffice building to accommodate the land office. Evidently this letter resulted from the recommendation of the inspector. The office has never been recommended a change."

No Decision Made
