The deceased was one of the pioneer women of this valley as she came to the Grande Ronde in 1835. She was the wife of John Stotts whom she married December 28, 1848. In 1850 they moved from Kentucky to Missouri and in the spring of 1864 they started for Oregon. She leaves five children who are Mrs. N. M. Berkley, James Stotts, Mrs. Amelia Young, Mrs. Fannie Hall, and Fred Stotts.
The funeral will take place tomorrow morning at ten o'clock from the family residence at the foot of North Depot street, the Rev. J. W. Compton, of Wingville, officiating. The sorrowing husband and children have the heartfelt sympathy of the entire community at this time of their bereavement.

Want \$50,000,000

Chicago March 27—John D. Rockefeller's latest letter to the University of Chicago was received today and is considered as pointing to an endowment of \$50,000,000 for the school, which is known to be one of President Harper's most cherished ideas, and to a continuance of Mr. Rockefeller's plans for the university in spite of Dr. Harper's illness.
The letter was sent in reply to a telegram from the students through Andrew McLeish, acting president of the board of trustees, to the founder of the school at the time of its 44th convocation.

In the letter Mr. Rockefeller says: "We will unite in fervent hope and prayer that Dr. Harper's most valuable life may be spared to carry out his cherished wishes for the advancement and growth of the university."
It is pointed out that Dr. Harper's most cherished plan is a \$50,000,000 endowment.

In their messages the students asked Mr. Rockefeller to manifest continued interest in the university in the time of its sorrow over President Harper's illness.

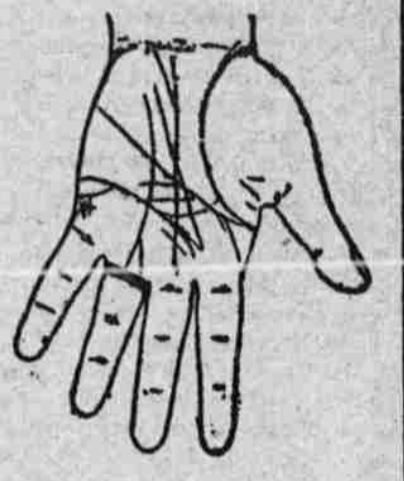
