PIPE FOR ACROSS THE TRACK

The city council yesterday purchased five thousand feet of four inch wood pipe to be used to extend the water mains across the railroad track. This pipe cost the city sixteen cents per foot f. o. b. cars in La Grande.

At this rate the city by using the wooden pipe in lead of the iron pipe of the same size makes a saving of five hundred and fifty dollars. When this system of mains is installed it will afford the much needed fire protection. It is the intention of the council to put in four or five fire hydrants on that side.

This is a good move on the part of the council and one which will meet with general approval.

Illicit Distillery

Spokane March 28—An illicit still and 50 gallons of apple jack were seized by Deputy U. S. International Revenue Collector C. A. Cole and Deputy United States Marshal Davenport in a raid made Sunday on a farmhouse 12 miles northwest of Rosalia Wash. George Allman, owner of the farm, was arrested and brought to Spokane Sunday afternoon. Messrs. Cole and Davenport drove to the farm from Rosalia in an unused outbuilding they unearthed the moonshiner's outfit. A large mash tank, several feet of pipe and vessels to receive the distilled product was found. A cask containing 50 gallons of apple jack was also found.

Imnaha Boat Service

Imnaha, Ore.—There is rejoicing among the copper men of this district over the assurance that the \$35,000 appropriation secured from the national government by Senator Hayburn of Idaho will enable the federal engineers to put the Wallowa dredge in commission soon. Had it not been for this provision no improvement of the Snake river between Lawiston and Imnaha could have been made the present season.

There are sixteen rapids and shoals on which the Wallowa will be worked as soon as the spring floods will permit the dredge to get to them. The principal one of these is the wild Goose rapids, where the ill-fated Imnaha was lost on the rocks.

By the time that the Wallowa has spent one season on the upper Snake mining men believe that there will be no trouble in keeping the Mountain Gem steambot on the Lawiston Imnaha run steadily.—Wallowa Democrat

Roosevelt and Diaz

Laredo Texas March 28—Efforts are being made by citizens of Laredo to bring about a meeting between President Roosevelt and President Diaz when the former comes to the south west early in April.

In the event of a meeting being arranged the two presidents would grasp hands on the international bridge over the Rio Grande river, each remaining on his respective side of the boundary line.

Not Guilty

The state utterly failed to sustain the indictment against Lloyd Scriber and James Beaver yesterday in Justice Hoogh's court. At the conclusion of the evidence the district attorney in his address stated as the testimony was in direct opposition, relative to the facts that he would leave it to the jury without comment, Attorney Slater, the defendants' attorney, stated that he would not take up the time of the jury in arguing the case and in less than five minutes the jury brought in a verdict of acquittal.

CZAR ISSUES RE-SCRIPT TO POLAND

(Scripps News Association) St Petersburg, March 29—The Emperor today issued a rescript addressed to M. Maximovich, Governor General of Poland, ordering him to elaborate the scheme of reforms, if necessary for the prosperity of Poland, but to lawfully and firmly suppress the present disturbances.

London March 29—The Daily Telegraph this morning says that it understands that the principal French bank ing houses which opposed the Russian loan have now yielded and that the loan will be concluded.
