Under Ground Wreck

New York March 29—A runaway construction train on the subway crashed into a bulkhead at the bottom of the shaft at 168th street today. It is feared that several laborers lost their lives in the explosion which followed. The shock of the explosion was felt for nearly a mile. The police reserves and two companies of firemen hurried to the scene, and two firemen were overcome by smoke in attempting to make rescues and investigating the disaster. While attempting to run a second train through the tunnel to the bottom, it is said that a quantity of dynamite behind the bulkhead exploded by concussion, and the timbers caught fire.

NO LIVES LOST

(Later)—All the employees in the subway at the time of the accident have been accounted for, and there is no loss of life. At two o'clock p m, the fire is still burning. It is stated that the fire will retard the work in the subway for a period of six months.
