Northwest News

The saloon license at Palouse, Wash., has been raised to \$750.
 Ellensburg, Wash., has organized a commercial club with 80 active members, and more coming.

Six hundred thousand bushels of wheat of last year's crop, have been shipped from Endicott, Wash. The place is building rapidly.

Farmers who have lived in the Palouse country for 30 years, declare the general crop prospect has never been better at this time of the year.

At Fort Assiniboine, during cavalry drill, the horse of George Hudson, of the third cavalry, stepped into a badger hole and fell, breaking Hudson's neck.

Dr. Albert B. Craig, for several years steward of the Medical Lake Insane asylum, is dead at Philadelphia of cerebro spinal meningitis, after 13 hours illness.

The Government has withdrawn 700,000 acres of timber land in Nez Perce and Latah counties, Idaho, from settlement; it is not understood why, and the order came very abruptly and unexpectedly.

G. K. Herry, a professional colonizer, promises to land 3500 Eastern families in British Columbia within ten years if the government will concede a little more favorable terms upon which public land may be secured.
