RUSSIA'S TERMS OF PEACE

(By Scripps News Association)
St. Petersburg, April 1.—According to peace reports circulated on the bourse today state that Russia will cede the southern island of Sakhalien to Japan and agree to leave Manchuria and Korea permanently outside of the sphere of Russian influence and the Eastern Chinese railroad be turned over to Japan for cession to China or to an international syndicate upon consideration of \$15,000,000 which Japan is to accept in lieu of indemnity.

Painful Silence

New York, April 1.—When James H. Hyde, vice president of the Equitable Assurance Society, reached his office at 10:30 this morning, he was asked if he intended to resign in response to the demand of the president, James W. Alexander, who yesterday threatened to start an investigation of Hyde to be accompanied by a public exposure of alleged questionable methods. Hyde replied: "I have nothing to say. I intend to maintain my policy of silence. There may be a statement later. From people close to Hyde it is learned that he will refuse to resign and will go on to the bitter end."

The conference closed at three forty five. It was announced that the committee representing the equitable policy holders, demanded twenty eight of fifty two directors. The two existing vacancies in the board are to be filled by men chosen by the policy holders. Mr. Root, counsel for the Equitable, stated that he would recommend acceptance of this plan to the board of directors.

Sec. Morton III

Emperor's Reception

Tangier, Morocco, March 31.—Preparations are complete for the reception here of Emperor William. The pier has been carpeted and decorated and numerous arches have been erected in the streets along the route of the procession. The Moorish and German flags are displayed everywhere. The garri-on, newly uniformed, today rehearsed its part in the reception, under Kadl Sir Harry MacLean. The natives are very enthusiastic over the welcome to be given the German emperor.

Emperor William will land at 3 o'clock a. m. and will be received at the mole by Al-del Makek, a Moorish deputation, representative of the diplomatic corps and members of the German colony. His majesty will then proceed to the palace, which has been placed at his disposal by the sultan. After a few minutes rest he will arrive to the Marahan plateau, where tea in the Moorish fashion will be served in a tent sent by the sultan, and Abdel Makek will read a letter from the sultan bidding the emperor formal welcome and present the sultan's gifts. This ceremony will be followed by a military fantasia and march past by the garrison of Tangier.
