**Can't Hold Office**

Washington April 1—M. J. Hornsby a young negro, who twice passed a civil service examination and twice has been appointed to clerkships in the postoffice at Yazoo, Miss., has complained at the White House that he is prevented from holding his position by reason of the brutality of White citizens of Yazoo.

Hornsby was presented at the White House by Rev. S. L. Carothers, but the President was unable to take up the case because practically all that remains of his time before leaving for his western trip has been filled with engagements. The case was stated to Secretary Loeb, however, and Hornsby was referred to the civil service commission.

According to the negro's story, he entered on his duties at the Yazoo office, whereupon certain white patrons of the office thrashed him several times when he was caught going to and from his duties. The mistreatment resulted in the resignation of Hornsby, but he took the examination for the vacancy that was created by his own resignation. Others who took the examination were two negroes, one negro and two white men.

**A Sad Ending**

The following from an exchange will interest Montgomery Ward's customers in this locality:

Here is the experience of a farmer near Farmeraville. Ten years ago he put an X mark on a silver dollar and came to town and spent it with a merchant. Before the week was out he got the marked dollar back for poultry and spent it with the home merchant.

Four times in six years that dollar came home to him for produce and three times he heard of it in the pockets of his neighbors. The last time he got it in change nearly four years ago, he sent it to a Chicago mail order firm that had amassed a hundred million dollars by selling third rate goods at second rate prices. He has not seen the marked dollar since and never will until the crack of doom. That dollar will never pay any more school or road tax for him, never help build up the town or county never bless and brighten the homes of his neighbors. He sent it entirely out of the circle of usefulness for him.

Moral:—Send your dollars where you will get a chance at them again, where they will help you pay your taxes, build your bridge, educate your children and enhance the value of your farms.
