It is the purpose to secure pledges from a sufficient number of the voters of each county who will pledge their support to such a candidate to the legislature that will either cause his election or secure his defeat therefore called "The Balance of power."

The following is the pledge signed and explains the object:
"I hereby agree to work and vote in the State, County and Municipal primaries and elections for the candidates recommended by the County or Municipal Committee appointed for that purpose, unless I am convinced that I can accomplish more for Good Citizenship by supporting other candidates."

The past season's crop of celery in Orange County, Cal., amounted to over 1700 carloads valued at half a million dollars.
