School Land Frauds

Salem Ore. April 4—The Marion county grand jury convened yesterday to investigate extensive frauds in school lands of the state. It is estimated that seven-eighths of the lands have been fraudulently acquired and Oregon has been swindled out of hundreds of thousands of acres of land by rauds which extend over many years. The methods used were similar to those alleged to have been practiced by the Hyde-Benson ring, application being made through fictitious persons or dummies, and titles being acquired through perjury.

Unknown Drowned

Payette, April 4—Will Short discovered the body of a man floating in the river about two miles above Payette. The remains were recovered and brought to this city where an inquest was held. The remains are unidentified, but are those of a man of about 35 years of age, 5 feet 4 inches tall with blonde mustache. Two dollars and a piece of plug tobacco were found in the pockets, but no writing to aid in identifying the body. It is supposed the man had attempted to go out to an island on the ice during the recent cold spell and fell through and was drowned.

Idaho Pioneer

Boice, April 4—Judge Jo Waldo Huston, who had been a central figure in the affairs of Idaho for nearly forty years, died at his home in this city Sunday afternoon at 1 o'clock, aged 73 years, the immediate cause of death being a clot of blood in his heart. The judge had been in failing health for many weeks, lingering between life and death and final dissolution was not unexpected to the members of his family.

Campaign Ended

Chicago, April 4—One of the most spirited political contests of recent years was wound up in Chicago last night. Municipal ownership of street railways has been the issue. John M Harlan, son of Justice Harlan of the United States supreme court, is the Republican candidate for mayor, and Judge Edward F Duane of the circuit court here is the Democratic nominee. Both candidates stand pledged for municipal ownership, but by different methods. The Democratic party stands for the immediate purchase or condemnation of the tangible property and unexpired franchises of the railway company. The Republicans advocate the referendum of the question to the people by a referendum vote. The proposal of the Republican candidate, in event of a referendum vote in favor of a municipal ownership, contemplates a competitive traction system with a downtown subway, or the renewal on a conservative basis and with adequate remuneration to the city for the expiring railway franchises. Absolute refusal of the further franchises and prosecution of the street railway companies for incompetency in relation to unexpired franchises are promised by the Democratic leaders.

Besides Harlan and Duane, Oliver W Stewart, Prohibitionist, and John Collinson, Socialist, are active candidates for the mayoralty. The Republican managers claim the election of Harlan by 20,000 plurality. The Democrats seem confident that Duane will have anywhere from 30,000 to 50,000 plurality. It is not thought likely that the Socialists will poll more than 10,000, a fifth of their vote last November.

Loda April 4—The would be assassin of Police Commissioner Szarbalowicz died today. He never regained consciousness after being cut down by the policeman who arrested him.
