"I don't exactly say that I need a rest, but I am going to take one in the open, under God's blue heavens," said President Roosevelt today, standing on the platform by his special train at the Pennsylvania station and conversing with Congressman Oimstead, United States Attorney McCarrroll and United States Marshal Leonard, in the presence of a great crowd that gathered at the station to meet him. It was suggested to the president that things would go along in a smooth manner even if he were absent.

"Oh, things will be all right," he said. "I have left Taft sitting on the lid, keeping down that San Domingo matter."

Later, he said: "I am going to have an outing. I am going to get away where I won't even think of a fourth class postmaster."

When the train came in the crowd was in the station balcony and gave the president a cheer as the train stopped. He stood on the rear platform, waving his hand to the crowd and fairly beaming with good nature. When the train stopped, the president stepped from the platform with the remark to a secret service officer, "Pass right along now, and if this crowd isn't too big I'll shake with all of you."

At this there was a rush to shake hands with him.

Cordova in Prison

New Brunswick, N. J., April 4.—J. Frank Cordova, the former pastor of the South River Methodist church, who eloped two years ago with Miss Julia Brown, a choir singer in his church, was taken to state's prison here yesterday to serve a term of four years for abandoning his wife and assaulting her.

Wealthy Widow Dead

Berkley, Cal., April 4.—Mrs. Lella Batterman, the wealthy widow of the late T. B. Batterman, a well known mining man, was found dead in her bed at her home on Channing Way. Death resulted from asphyxiation. The gas was found turned fully on and the door of the room was locked from the inside. Whether death resulted accidentally or not is not known.

New York, April 4.—All of the public schools throughout the country yesterday celebrated the one hundredth anniversary of the birth of Hans Anderson, the great writer of fairy tales, which really occurred the day before. The celebrations included an account of the life of Anderson and the reading and recitation of his stories. Anderson is conceded to be the greatest writer for children that the world has ever known.

Internal Eruption

London, April 4.—The Exchange Telegraph, states that further internal trouble is feared in Russia. News from the interior is of a grave character. Serious riots have occurred in Warsaw in which many were injured. The authorities were unable to preserve order and the rioting continued. Reports from Tiflis trans-Caucasus state further rioting there yesterday. The Baltic provinces also are reported to be agitated and an outbreak is threatened.
