LOCKED IN AN ICE CHEST

Tacoma, Wash., April 5—A sensa-
tional report of the robbery of the
City Restaurant shortly before mid-
night Monday, by two men, was given
to the police soon after the crime was
committed. Miss Jessie Jensen, the
night cook, who declared she had been
locked in the ice chest by the thieves
and had finally escaped by prying
open the door with a cleaver which she
found inside, gave the facts to the
officers. She was alone in the place at
the time. According to the woman's
story the men gained admittance by
prying open the rear door, evidently
under the impression that the place
was entirely deserted at midnight.
One of the intruders, so Miss Jensen
stated, wore a red handkerchief over
the lower part of his face and the
other had his face blackened.

Upon entering the kitchen, accord-
ing to the woman's story, one of the
men seized her and forced her into the
large ice chest and locked the door
upon her. It appears from subsequent
investigation that they then rifled the
cash register, securing \$10 in cash.
They escaped by the rear door.

Demand Cash

Antwerp April 5—The Belgian com-
mittee of holders of Dominican bonds
refuses to have anything to do with
the proposed arrangement between
San Domingo and the United States
and will protest against the plan. The
proposal to deposit money from the
customs collections in an American
bank until a definite arrangement has
been completed, is not satisfactory to
Belgian holders, who demand the pay-
ment of \$27,000 a month due to them
in accordance with their contract with
the Dominican government. Instruc-
tions have been sent to the commit-
tee's representative at San Domingo
to oppose the agreement.

Of the total debt of San Domingo,
which amounts to about \$37,000,000,
over one half is due to Belgians, who
own \$15,000,000 worth of Dominican
bonds, the accumulated and unpaid
interest upon which brings the amount
to \$16,000,000.

French Attitude

Paris April 5—An official note this
afternoon relative to the meeting of
the cabinet ministers yesterday does
not mention Morocco, but unofficial
statements have been published to the
effect that the government is deter-
mined to pursue the work of civiliza-
tion and development of Morocco, at
the same time maintaining the prin-
ciple of the open door for the com-
merce of the entire world.
