Still On Warpath

El Paso, April 6—John St. Clair, a well known prospector, whose statements are considered reliable, has returned from the Yaqui country near Ure, Sonora, and reports that the Indians are still on the war path. He says that Malpucho, the old chief, is at the head of a band of over 50 and is devastating the whole country, murdering, pillaging and burning. Grain and cattle ranches are being abandoned and the people are going into the towns for protection. The whole country is in a state of panic.

Mail routes between the small towns have been abandoned and provisions are getting scarce. Although the country is overrun with soldiers, he says, the Indians are fearless and continue their depredations. St Clair does not believe it safe for Americans to go into the Yaqui country at this time as the Indians are very hostile to Americans.

Utah's Participation

Portland April 4—Utah has decided to erect a state building at the Lewis and Clark Exposition. Such was the conclusion of the commission after an inspection of the Exposition grounds and the selection of a site. The structure will be ideally located just north of the New York building and on the slope of Lakeview Terrace.

It is planned to erect a building 100 feet long and 85 feet wide. The lower floor will be utilized for exhibition purposes, while the second story will be arranged for the reception of visitors. Fifteen thousand dollars will be expended for the building. No difficulty will be experienced in having the building completed and the exhibits installed before opening day as the work, it is to begin this week.

One of the most important features of the Utah display will be a concentrator in actual operation, located in an annex. The concentrator will cost \$10,000 and will be one of the most novel displays of the entire Fair. Four men will be required to operate it. It will show the process of refining gold, silver and copper from the time the crude ore is turned in until it comes out as refined metal. The rocks containing the minerals will first be crushed and then the different ingredients will be separated, all within the view of the visitors to the Centennial.

Sue Standard Oil

Chicago April 6— The city of Chicago today filed a suit for \$40,000 against the Standard Oil company. The bill is based upon the alleged non-payment of inspection fees by the Standard Oil company. The company has for years refused to pay for inspection made by the city under an ordinance regulating commerce in naphtha and gasoline. Representatives of the Standard Oil company held that gasoline and naphtha are not products of petroleum, and that the ordinance does not apply.

Medford Or. April 5—At two o'clock yesterday afternoon, about 5,000 persons assembled to witness the breaking of ground for the Medford and Crater Lake railroad. The ceremonies were opened by a short address by Holbrook Wistington and followed by others, among whom were Hon H B Miller, consul to Japan, Hon W I Vawter and D A Miller, citizens of Medford.

After the addresses, Mrs A A Davis wife of the president of the company, sprinkled the ground with a bottle of champagne, presented by Wm A Hutton, and threw the first shovel of dirt, after which mule teams with plows and scrapers started to grade.
