Still On Warpath

El Paso, April 6-John St. Clair, well known prospector, whose statements are considered reliable, has returned from the Yaqui county near Ure, Sonora, and reports that the Indians are still on the war path. He says that Malpuche, the old chief, is at the head of a band of over 50 and is devasting the whole co untry. mur dering, pilaging and burning. Grain and cattle ranches are being abandoned and the people are going into the towns for protection. The whole country is in a state of panic.

Mail routes between the small sowns have been shandoned and provisions are getting scarce. Although the country is overrun with soldiers, he says, the Indians are fearless and continue their depredations. St Clair does not believe it safe for Americans to go into the Yaqui country at this time as the Indians are very hostile to Americans.
