Shonts Goes To Work

Chicago April 7—"Direct business methods, publicity and absolutely no politics. This is the keynote of the policy of the Panama commission to which President Roosevelt has seen fit to appoint me president of." This declaration was made by Theodore P Shonts who arrived from New York today, being his first visit since receiving his appointment. He will return to Washington in a few days and take up the details of the canal commission. He announced the appointment of Tom Brown as his private secretary of the commission. Brown was Secretary of Paul Morton on the Santo Fe for several years. Shonts says he will retain his position of the Clover Leaf and direct its affairs from whatever point he makes his headquarters. "Our policy will be to work precisely as we have worked in building and operating great railroad lines" said Shonts, "with the people of the United States as stockholders. There will be monthly reports of the progress made, of the funds expended and the outlook for the work just the same as railroads do to their stockholders."

Stop The Drivers

Chicago, April 7—The strike situation is becoming more and more intense. The teamsters union has pickets stationed around the Montgomery & Ward's store who turn back all drivers who have goods for the company. The discharge of several drivers who refused to deliver goods to the strike bound company threatens to bring about a general walkout of teamsters of all the railway and express companies in the city. The police are preparing for a prolonged battle, and in addition to the extra force stationed around the Montgomery & Ward block to prevent violence, a strong detachment is held in readiness at the station to answer riot calls. The strike was called by the Federation of Labor council to force the great mail order house and other similar companies to recognize the garment makers union. Four arrests were made up to noon in connection with the efforts of the strike to stop the delivery of goods to Montgomery Ward & Co. John Olson, a teamster was severely beaten by a crowd.

Charge Perjury

The federal officials say prominent representative packers, both in Chicago and other cities left the jury after telling lies, believing they "fooled" the government. Fifteen subpoenas for additional witnesses have been issued and it is believed that from these parties evidence will be wholly on the perjury investigation.

FOUND REST OF BODY

San Francisco April 7—The police are as badly as sea today as ever as regards the identity of the body found out in the street last Wednesday, despite the fact that they have found the head. The identification of the body last evening as that of Harry Una was an error. Hundreds visited the morgue during the past twenty-four hours, but none have offered information that would throw any light upon the identification.

The authorities are satisfied that there are those who have viewed the body who knew the man in life, but are afraid to disclose any information fearing the same fate might befall them. Detectives in a launch have visited every boat in the harbor and have searched the interior of all boats but so far have not been able to secure any tangible clue. On the grounds that the head, the legs, and the arms do not seem to fit the trunk the theory is advanced by some that a double murder has been committed, but this theory is not credited by the detectives, as they claim that the head, arms and legs were in the water fully sixteen hours before being discovered therefore the incongruity of appearance of those parts when compared with the trunk.

The dead man was identified this afternoon by an interpreter in an employment office, as a Mexican who called at the agency in quest of work, and the files of the agency are being gone over in the hope of finding his name.

Finish Tomorrow
