Earthquake at Lahore

Lahore, April 7.—The report reached this place this morning that the entire town of Palanpur has been leveled to the ground. The city of Palanpur had a population of over twenty thousand inhabitants.
The city of Palanpur is the capital of the province of Guzerat and is one of the trade centers of province.
Its altitude is very low and the climate is considered warmest in all India. Earthquakes are of frequent occurrence and the natives have been calling the attention of the white population to the fact that a general upheaval was expected soon. The loss of life has not been reported.

Mormon Conference

Salt Lake April 7.—The seventy fifth annual conference of the Mormon church convened today in the tabernacle and will continue until Sunday. The city is filled with conference visitors from all parts of this and adjoining states and many representatives from Canada, Mexico and other distant countries. Apostle Reed Smoot is not in attendance, as he left yesterday for San Francisco. The opening session of the conference was addressed by President Joseph P. Smith.

President Smith in his address referred to some recent criticisms of the policy of the church under his leadership. Speaking of his critics, who are or have been within the church the president said they were "the boile carbuncles and other excrescences on the body of the organization." In such instances, he said, there was "but one thing to do, what the surgeon does when the patient is thus afflicted, cut them out and off."

If any members of the church were dissatisfied with the manner in which the tidings had been handled, let them complain, he said, and he would gladly meet them. If the church desired to call him to account it could be done without causing noise or disturbance.

Speaking generally of the expenditures, he said the people of the church in the southwest had suffered heavily from floods and the church had helped them. The church had purchased a piece of land in Jackson county, Missouri, for the erection of a temple as foretold by the prophet, Joseph Smith. Large sums had been expended in foreign lands including Great Britain, Norway, Sweden and the islands of the south seas, where land has been bought and churches established. More than half of the bonded indebtedness of the church had been paid off, President Smith said, and the church would soon be free from debt.
Hugh J. Cannon, just returned from a three years' mission in Germany, told of the activities of the Mormon missionaries in Germany, Switzerland, Austria, Hungary, Roumania and Serbia. He said missionaries soon would be sent over the Alps into Italy. He spoke of the opposition to the Mormons in Germany and said 200 missionaries had been banished from Prussia in one year.
