## Road Makers

The county court of Jackson county Ore., has recently purchased two rock crushers of the latest pattern, which weigh nearly 3000 pounds each. It requires from ten to twelve horses to operate one of them successfully. They will be put to work crushing rock to make roads with.

Several of the counties in Oregon own rock crushers, and where used, the report is that they are both convenient and economical as road makers.

## Fine Condition

Superintendent of the sugar factory, Chas. Woodhouse, states that so far this has been an ideal season for sugar beets. The ground is prepared and in the best of condition awaiting the 30,000 pounds of beet seed direct from Germany, which are expected to arrive tomorrow. Already over 3000 acres are contracted and with the gratifying results of last season the beet culture is in better favor than it ever has been since the industry started.

Superintendent Woodhouse has a force of fifteen men cleaning, repairing and painting at the factory, preparing for the next campaign.

## Fine Beef

Four car loads of extra choice beef were shipped today from the stock yards of the sugar company. At the commencement of the season there was over 600 head of cattle, but by the first of the month it is thought all will be marketed. This has been an ideal winter for feeding, and there has been between 7000 and 8000 tons of pulp fed to cattle and sheep, in addition to hundreds of tons of hay. This pulp furnished a market for a class of hay that would not bear shipping out.

The poles taken down are being reset just a little further out in the street. The company intends putting in new poles over the entire system in the city as soon as practicable.

The sportsmen who have a part of the tule land leased are preparing to plant wild rice in the marshes in order that there will be sufficient duck feed there to tempt the ducks to nest there and make it their regular feeding grounds. This is a good plan.

The Grande Ronde Lumber Co. have received the machines for the rebuilding of the planing mill which was recently destroyed by fire. The new building will be fifty by one hundred and twenty feet, and the new machinery is of the latest improved.

G. A. Nichols is in the city today registering from Mexico. Mr. Nichols was formerly a resident of this county but is now interested in coffee and sugar culture in our sister Republic.

W. W. West is here from Pendleton and will have charge of the books of the new creamery company of both places. He is also purchasing agent for the Columbia Produce Co. of Pendleton and will be in the market while here for some of the Grande Ronde produce.

The Electric Light Co. is moving its poles on the outside of the sidewalks in the cement sidewalk district.

Two more car loads of poles for the Grande Ronde Electric Co. will arrive tomorrow. The poles are set to a distance of five miles east of the city, nearly one third of the distance.
