**Cement Walks**

Contractors Scott & Kuhn have completed the cement walk in front of the grocery store of J D McKennon, and now have their force at work on the walk being built by the La Grande National Bank. They received a car of cement last week and another is now in transit. As the council has issued the order that all walks within certain prescribed districts shall be constructed before August 1, it would be the proper thing for those who possibly can, to commence immediately as this furnishes a market for labor just at a season of the year when it is needed.

**Our Census**

Assessor J H Morton states that he realizes the importance of the census to be taken by his office this season and proposes to be as accurate as possible, and will have the census of La Grande, Elgin, Union and Cove taken by special enumerators aside from the deputies who are taking the property values. Anyone who has kept in touch with the progress that the city has made, knows very well that such a condition is hardly possible.

Mrs Eliza Gale, widow of Joseph Gale, one of the first provisional governors of Oregon, was laid to rest Mar. 1 at Weston cemetery. She was 85 years of age and had been ill but one month.

Since the death of her illustrious husband in Eagle Valley in 1873, Mrs Gale has lived with her daughter, Mrs Edwin Simpson, who, with her husband moved to Wild Horse creek near Athena in 1875.

Mrs Gale was a niece of the famous Walla Walla chief, Pic-pic-mox-mox, and leaves but two children. Mrs Lucretia Simpson with whom she resided for 32 years and Mrs Ella Page of Seattle.
