There were some demonstrations, but no blood was shed.

NO SIGN OF AGREEMEN T

The conference between the mayor labor leaders and the employers adjourned again this afternoon without reaching an agreement as to the settle ment of the strike against Montgom ery Ward and Company, The union lea fere announce positively that they will fight the employers to the bitter end. Blockades and assaults continu ed this afternoon in the down town streets, and the caravans moved with difficulty aided by the police,
