(By Scripps News Association) St. Louis, April 17—Two hundred express drivers for baggage parcel delivery struck this morning for recognition.

Call For Bids

The Recorder of the city of La Grande will receive bids for the following described work at his office from this date until four o'clock p. m. May third, 1905.

Eight hundred linear feet of ditch to be dug from a point at the intersection of Harding street with Fourth street to the northeast corner of X street.

Fifteen hundred and sixty five feet of ditch to be dug from a point at the intersection of Osburn and Greenwood streets to a point one block east to the intersection of Valley street, thence north two blocks to Valley street and thence west two blocks to North Fir street.

Twelve hundred and fifty feet of ditch to be dug from a point at the intersection of Osburn street and North Fir street north to Trowbridge street, thence east one block to intersection of Trawbridge and North Greenwood streets.

Five hundred and ten feet of ditch to be dug from a point at the intersection of North Greenwood street and R streets south to the intersection of Monroe avenue.

Three hundred and sixty nine feet of ditch to be dug from a point at the intersection of O and Eighth street and running west one block to intersection of seventh and O street.

Eighteen hundred feet of ditch to be dug from a point at the intersection of Adams avenue and Spruce street, west to a point eighteen hundred feet from place of beginning.

All of said ditch to be dug three and one half feet deep and one and one half feet wide, all street crossings to be left closed subject to orders of water superintendent. Said ditch to be filled subject to the orders of the Water Supt. Said work to be completed on or before the twenty first day of May 1905. A certified check for an amount equal to ten per cent of the amount of the bid to accompany each bid. The contractor to furnish a good and sufficient bond for the faithful completion of said work. The city of La Grande reserves the right to reject any and all bids.

FRAUD CASES COME HIGH

Portland, April 17.—According to a conservative estimate, the land fraud cases have already cost the government \$35,000, and the end is not yet, nor does this amount include the fees of Prosecutor Heney. It has been given out that it is not his intention to touch a dollar of the salary allowed him as United States district attorney, a private arrangement concerning his compensation having been entered into with Attorney General Moody at the time Mr. Heney was engaged to prosecute the cases, and this understanding is said also to relate to his conduct of the California cases.

Fully 75 defendants are involved in the proceedings, and if the government's expectation that all will be convicted is realized, it will result in the accumulation of quite a fund, as the maximum fine in each case of conspiracy is \$10,000, besides two year's imprisonment, and the indictments, with a few exceptions, are based on conspiracy charges.

Perry Trial Begins

(By Scripps News Association) Chicago April 17—The trial of Isaac N. Perry, the president of the National Bank of North America, commenced here today. Perry is indicted under two charges, one for attempting to defraud insurance Co's on a plant of the Chicago Car and Locomotive works at Hegewisch.

No Church Reform

St. Petersburg, April 17—Emperor Nicholas has denied the petition of a group of influential clergy for convocation of a general council to effect reforms in ecclesiastical administration. In a note officially made public the emperor says he finds it impossible in the present disturbed times to undertake a task of such magnitude, requiring calm consideration. He says he intends, as soon as there is a favorable moment, to summon a council of the old Russian church for an official discussion of questions of faith and ecclesiastical reform.

JAP EMIGRATION TO BE REDUCED

Honolulu April 17—Governor Carter has vetoed the county government bill and both senate and house have passed the bill over the governor's veto, the senate by a vote of 12 to 3 and the house by a vote of 27 to 3. The steamship Korea from Japan has brought a report that the Japanese government has reduced the limit of emigrants to Hawaii from 500 per steamer to less than 100. This action has been taken, it is rumored, owing to the anti-Japanese agitation in California.

New Petition

Oklahoma City O. T. April 17—Acting upon the general belief that the statehood bill was defeated in the last congress by reason of the controversy over the union of New Mexico and Arizona a movement has been launched in Oklahoma and Indian Territory to enter a vigorous protest against being included in a bill where New Mexico and Arizona are concerned. Representatives of the two territories met here today and called a convention to meet at Oklahoma City on July 12 for the purpose of formulating a petition to congress for joint admission to statehood without reference to the other territories.
