Carry Gospel Tidings

New York, April 18.—Two remarkable happenings were revealed yesterday when the crack schooner yacht Coronet, one of the fastest and best yachts on the Atlantic, and a craft that all yachtsmen expected to see entered in the Kaiser's cup race, sailed from Brooklyn to be used as a gospel ship by the Holy Ghost and Us society. At the same time mariners learned that the Wanderer, once a famous craft, carrying one of the proudest yacht flags in the country, and later converted into a slave-ship, is already being used by the Holy Ghosts to carry their teachings abroad. On these crafts the gospel will be carried to the dwellers of the South Sea Islands and into other far-away heathen lands.

Carrie Sells Home

Topeka Kan April 18—Mrs Carrie Nation closed a deal for the sale of her Topeka property this afternoon and left for Chicago, where she will spend a few weeks looking after her publication, the Home Defender, which is being issued there. State News

A large steamer carrying the English flag is now taking aboard, at Portland, 3000 tons of Oregon hay, for China.

Gilliam county sheep men are busy sheep shearing. They expect this year's clip will be 1,500,000 pounds of wool. Prices for wool there range from 15 to 17 cents per pound.

Word comes from Washington City, that within a short time Major Langfite, the officer in charge, will advertise for bids for the construction of the first lock of the Dalles Celilo Canal. This little item has within it a kernel of far more importance to the people of Eastern Oregon than many pages about the Russian and Japan war.

THREE KILLED IN EXPLOSION

Trenton, Tenn., April 18.—Three men were killed, three injured and much damage done to property here Saturday by the explosion of a quantity of powder in a storehouse in the rear of a hardware store. The dead: Robert Phelan, owner of the store. Dr. Parker, Trenton. Mr. Arnold. Fatally injured: John K. Pearce. Mr. Phelan was trying a target gun, and it is thought a ball penetrated a can of powder, causing the explosion. Nearly every business house in the business district was damaged.

Map Coast Lights

Washington, April 18.—It has been discovered that foreign nations have taken the pains to get such accurate information as to the location of the searchlights at United States coast defenses that they have plotted them on maps, the lights being immensely valuable at night as range for sailing.
