Holy Thursday In The Catholic Church

On Thursday, April 20th, at 8 p. m., an instruction will be given in the Catholic Church on the doctrine of the Real Presence of Christ in the Holy Eucharist.

This doctrine is the foundation on which the whole superstructure of Catholic teaching rests. "If it sagged in the least everything built thereon tumbles into ruin."

For reasons which need not be here explained, most books of Catholic theology are printed in the Latin language. But there is one book written in English on the "Real Presence" which is a classic on that subject. Its author was Cardinal Wiseman, since the Reformation the first Catholic Archbishop of Westminster in London. He died about a generation ago.

For many years Wiseman was Rector of the English College in Rome where native born British students are trained for the priesthood in Great Britain. He was an Oriental scholar with a world reputation for depth and accuracy of knowledge in all questions belonging to the languages and literatures of the East, that is to say of Syria, Arabia, Persia and Hindoostan.

Christ did not think or speak in Hebrew but in Syro-Chaldae which hardly bears, to the language of the Old Testament writers, any closer likeness than modern English shows toward the speech of Goethe and of Schiller.

Wiseman made this Syro-Chaldae tongue and its kindred dialects his special study and he was often complimented by the very enemies of Christianity for his profound and exact scholarship in these matters.

His book on the "Real Presence" contains eight lectures which were first delivered to the students of the English College already mentioned and published in London many years later. They show much learning and give many interesting details, but the main argument may be condensed into the size of an ordinary sermon losing little, either in force or in clearness by that process.

This is the instruction which will be given in the Catholic Church on the date mentioned before. One may not agree with Wiseman's reasoning but at the least it is worth hearing and worth weighing. He was, and today is, dear to the hearts, not only of English Catholics, but of English Protestants as well. For Wiseman was the brother and the friend of the whole English population and in his high place neither toadled to the rich nor made himself the tool or the dupe of a clique.

The book of which this notice is written made a deep impression on all thinking minds in England when it was first published. It had much to do with the famous Oxford or Tractarian movement which brought Newman Manning, Faber and many other scholarly Englishmen from the Anglican Communion into that of the Catholic Church.

All earnest people of every Church and of no religious belief whatever are respectfully invited to hear this celebrated yet sensible argument of Cardinal Wiseman in favor of the central and basic teaching of the Roman Catholic Church.

Catholics and Protestants alike have the sad confession to make that in past times they hated one another for Christ's sake. We live in a better day and we see in a clearer light that all men of good will upon this earth are the brothers and the friends of our Savior and our King.

NEGOTIATE FOR STREET RAILWAY

Chicago April 19—Negotiations to purchase the street railways has opened between the traction representatives and the city officials. The railways propose to modernize the lines and sell to the city at a fair price. The traction men admit that the public sentiment is too strong to be resisted, and that municipal ownership will have to be carried out.
