Prehistoric Men

Portland Ore., April 20—While excavating in a mound five miles southwest of Albany, near Calapoopa river, J. C. Crawford discovered the remains of several bodies of prehistoric men and also a small altar, undoubtedly used as a place for sacrifices. The remains of five bodies were found, the skeletons showing that all of the bodies had been mutilated.

Mr. Crawford, who has made a number of excavations in different mounds in this part of the state and who has acquired considerable reputation as an archeologist, thinks the people whose mounds he is now investigating, were undoubtedly cannibals. He has discovered mutilated bodies in a number of the mounds, while parts would often be entirely missing. There is conclusive evidence that decay was not the cause, as many of the finger bones and other small bones are in a perfect state of preservation, while the entire back bone or one or more of the limbs may be gone.

In some cases part of the face was missing, a circumstance never met with in other mounds Mr. Crawford has investigated. In one skull the whole face had been broken out.

TREPOFF'S NIECE SHOOT AT HIM

St Petersburg, April 20—Interesting details surrounding the recent arrests of a band of about a dozen terrorists are looking out. All were identified with the band of which Kallief the assassin of Sergius and McCullough the man recently killed by the accidental explosion of his own bomb, were members. Among those arrested were Mile Leontoff, daughter of the governor of Yakutsk, eastern Siberia, who, it is said, converted two pieces of Cossack General Trepoft to the doctrine of assassination and the statement is made that after the arrest of Mile Leontoff one of Trepoft's nieces actually attempted his life firing two shots at him, both of which missed. There upon two nieces became greatly stricken, and attempted to commit suicide one shooting herself and the other attempting to throw herself under a locomotive. Neither succeeded in taking her life.

Refused Coal

Port Louis Island of Mauritius April 20—The German steamer Junette late the British steamer Dunnell Castle, which cleared from Diego Suarez, Madagascar April 14 for Batavia, Java put in here today and asked for 900 tons of coal. She was informed that she would be allowed to take 600 tons, but when 100 tons had been taken on board the colonel officers stopped her from taking any more pending instructions from the home government. The action of the local officers was due to statements by members of the crew that the Junette is carrying stores to the Russian squadron in the China sea.
