Raise New Loan

Washington April 21.—It is learned here that the Japanese government is about to raise another domestic loan of \$50,000,000, and the fact that this follows so quickly on the fourth domestic loan and the issue of the \$50,000,000 foreign loan in New York and London, has led to an additional explanation designated to correct any misapprehension. This is to the effect that the expenditures, estimated at \$390,000,000, and the new loan has also been arranged by the agreement with the bankers made last March to supply \$100,000,000.

Dies in Opium Joint

Havre Mont., April 20.—The dead body of Lizzie Both, an 18 year old girl, the stepdaughter of George Orde was found in a Chinese opium joint today. The body was covered with bruises and coroner Gray believes she met a violent death. Toy, a Chinese gambler, has been arrested on suspicion. The affair has created much indignation.

Strike at Tiflis

Tiflis April 21.—A general strike of railroad men has broken out here and at Baku. The train service is entirely suspended. The employees of the tobacco factories at Baku have also struck.

Burn in Jail

New Orleans April 21.—In an attempt to escape, three prisoners yesterday fired the parish jail at Pontchartraine, La., 48 miles from New Orleans, two of them being cremated and a third fatally burned.

New Job For Sands

Washington April 21.—W S Sands, former secretary of the legation at Korea, and now adviser to the King, has been appointed secretary of the American legation at Panama, to succeed Lee, who becomes consul-general.

Barrett Resigns

Washington April 21.—John Barrett of Portland Ore, United States minister to Panama, has saved the state department the embarrassment of ordering his recall. He has asked that he be relieved of his post so that he may retire from the diplomatic corps. The government has been dissatisfied with some of Minister Barrett's acts and it was decided months ago that he should be succeeded at Panama by Judge Charles Magoon of the insular bureau, but it was the intention to assign him to another post.

Obtains \$2000

San Jose Cal April 21.—The officers have found one to Weber, a clairvoyant who, according to the statement of Mr and Mrs Frank Drew made them insane by persuading them to inhale some kind of a poisonous fume and then beguiled them out \$2000. The couple are in a sanitarium, and today are fairly rational. A letter has been sent to relatives in New Hampshire, conveying information as to their unfortunate and present condition.

Men Laid Off

Washington April 21.—On account of the shortage of last year's appropriation Commissioner Richards of the general land office has found it necessary to disperse temporarily with the services of 17 of the 80 special agents of that bureau. They have been merely furloughed and will be restored to the service when the appropriation bill becomes available on July 1 next. The suspensions have been made in localities where there was more than one agent and it is believed the service will not be materially crippled.

Eight hundred linear feet of ditch to be dug from a point at the intersection of Harding street with Fourth street to the northeast corner of X street.

Fifteen hundred and sixty five feet of ditch to be dug from a point at the intersection of Osburn and Greenwood streets to a point one block east to the intersection of Valley street, thence north two blocks to Valley street and thence west two blocks to North Fir street.

Twelve hundred and fifty feet of ditch to be dug from a point at the intersection of Osburn street and North Fir street north to Trowbridge street, thence east one block to intersection of Trowbridge and North Greenwood streets.

Five hundred and ten feet of ditch to be dug from a point at the intersection of North Greenwood street and E streets south to the intersection of Monroe avenue.

Three hundred and sixty nine feet of ditch to be dug from a point at the intersection of O and Eighth street and running west one block to intersection of seventh and O street.

Eighteen hundred feet of ditch to be dug from a point at the intersection of Adams avenue and Spruce street, west to a point eighteen hundred feet from place of beginning.

Said ditch to be filled subject to the orders of the Water Dept. Said work to be completed on or before the twenty first day of May 1906.
