The \$400 will be invested and the interest thereon will be devoted to the purchase of suitable prizes for the student annually preparing the best essay on the "Progress of Good Government." The fact was officially announced at the university tonight.

Walter Kent attempted to board a freight near Roseburg, Or., and lost a leg in the process. He comes from Butte, Mont., and has well-to-do relatives.
At a depth of 500 feet a flow of scalding hot water had been struck at Baker City. It will be used for heating buildings and the surplus for irrigation.
W. A. Fagen and H. Gorham, two sons of prominent families, came west, losing their money in mining deals, put poison in their whiskey and committed suicide at Denver.
Over four million acres of public land has been withdrawn from entry in Idaho as a forest reserve. Some will be restored to entry, the remainder purely agricultural land.
June 27 will be Oklahoma day at the Lewis and Clark fair. The Oklahoma Press association and the National Editorial Association will be present and take part in the exercises of the day.
Charles B. Billman made a statue of President McKinley for the city of Logansport, Ind. After waiting for four years for his pay, he has taken it away from the public square and set it up in his back yard.
"Veterans" of a New Jersey regiment who never saw service, have been drawing pensions for wounds and disabilities. The pension examiners who secured these pensions have resigned. They may be prosecuted.
Emil and Oscar Trop, twin brothers, on their way west leaped from the Great Northern overland train a few miles from Seattle. Emil's neck was broken and Oscar was seriously hurt. Both were well-to-do. Temporary insanity is given as the cause of their act.
State Land Agent West at Madras, is beginning to take action against illegal land entries. Rich bodies of timber land have been illegally home-steaded and taken by other illegal means in the coast counties. They will be proceeded against for perjury, forgery and conspiracy to defraud the state.
