WALL PAPER AT LESS THAN COST

HE SAW YOUNG KILL HIMSELF

Chicago April 22—Samuel Eisenberg, who claims that he saw Cassar Young kill himself while in a cab with Nan Patterson in New York, was seen here tonight. Eisenberg, who is a tailor, says that on the day of the shooting of Young he was walking along West Broadway when he passed a cab in which a man and woman were quarreling. The woman was crying and both the occupants were greatly excited. At one time, he said, they engaged in a struggle, but it was of short duration. Finally the woman laid her head on the man's shoulder. The man then reached around to a rear pocket and drew a revolver with which he shot himself.

Eisenberg declares that he became excited by the scenes he had witnessed and hurried away. Being unable to read English, he saw nothing of the case in the papers, and had nearly forgotten all about it until the other day when glancing through a Jewish paper he saw an account of the Patterson trial and concluded the couple he saw in the cab must have been Young and Nan Patterson.

AMERICAN APPLES IN ENGLAND

A local paper of Halifax, Nova Scotia, issues issue of January 25, 1906, states that, inquiring at Covent Garden Press Association, it was learned that American apples in England are in greater demand than the Canadian product; that this is owing to their superior general quality. The price for American apples here higher than for others, but this is partly due to the fact that American barrels contain 28 pounds more than Canadian barrels.

Union April 22—Business men of Hood River are negotiating with Wright & Wilbur, of Union, owners of the Eugene woolen mill plant, for the location of the same at Hood River. The owners of the Eugene plant have been in Hood River this week consulting the business men of that place with a view to closing the deal. Wright is cashier of the First National Bank of Union, Wilbur is superintendent of the Union woolen mill.

Must Resign

Washington April 21—The answer received by secretary Hitchcock from Governor J G Brady of Alaska regarding the latter's connection with the Reynolds Alaska Development company, is not satisfactory and the governor will be dismissed if he does not promptly resign. He is accused of using his position to further the interests of the mining company.

Finds a Fortune

Chicago April 22—A sale of the finding of lost treasure rivaling Alexander Dumas' description of the good fortune of Monte Christo, is told by John P Foss, who a few days ago found in an old safe in the cellar of his residence three certificates of stock in the People's Gas, Light & Coke Co. which the lawyers declare are worth approximately \$1,500,000.

Foss is 90 years old. Action has been commenced in the court by Foss to secure an accounting of the affairs of the People's Gas, Light & Coke Co and the return of his proportionate shares of stock, with accrued interest, which he claims he is now entitled to by virtue of the original stock certificates which he holds. The latter represents 15 per cent of the original capitalization of \$500,000.

Eight hundred linear feet of ditch to be dug from a point at the intersection of Harding street with Fourth street to the northeast corner of X street.

Fifteen hundred and sixty five feet of ditch to be dug from a point at the intersection of Osburn and Greenwood streets to a point one block east to the intersection of Valley street, thence north two blocks to Valley street, and thence west two blocks to North Fir street.

Twelve hundred and fifty feet of ditch to be dug from a point at the intersection of Osburn street and North Fir street north to Trowbridge street, thence east one block to intersection of Trawbridge and North Greenwood streets.
