OLD SWEETHEART GETS MILLIONS

Omaha Neb April 24—Although twice rejected by the girl he had loved since she was a little maid, O H Heron, the South African diamond king, has left her his entire fortune. The fortunate young woman is Mrs Joseph W Munchhoff of Chicago, formerly Miss Mattie Cannon of this city. She heard of her good luck while visiting in Denver, through a cable from Pretoria. Her father is T V Cannon of Chicago, president of the T V Maple Syrup company of Quebec. Heron was president of the Maine Wood Maple Syrup company, a rival concern. Miss Cannon refused Heron's hand on account of the difference in their ages, and married Munchhoff, whom she met when he was collecting furs in a merry-go-round at an Omaha resort. After her divorce from Munchhoff, Heron again pressed his suit, but was again refused. It is said to have been due to Miss Cannon's refusal to marry him that led Heron to go to South Africa. There he amassed a fortune of \$50,000,000, part of which he has since squandered.

New Forest Reserves

Batte April 22—A dispatch from Washington says the forestry bureau announced the creation of six additional reserves and two additions to reserves in Idaho, involving the withdrawal of 8,000,000 acres of public land, as follows:
 Henry's Lake, 500,000 acres, eastern portion of Fremont county; Sawtooth, 1,800,000 acres in Boise county; Payette, 1,000,000 acres, Idaho county; Squaw creek division of the Walser, 2,000,000 acres, eastern portion of Washington county; Shoshone, 1,000,000 acres in Shoshone county; Kootenai, 750,000 acres in Kootenai county; addition to Yellowstone reserve, 200,000 acres, northwestern corner of Blaine county; addition to Hitter Root, 450,000 acres, Idaho county.

Nailed to a Cross

Trinidad, Colo., April 24.—Nailed to the cross, just as the Savior died centuries ago, a fanatical member of the Penitentes is reported to have died Friday at Torres, Las Animas county, Col. The victim is reported to have died in agony which he willingly suffered, being wrought up to a delirium of religious fervor. The story comes from Mexicans who had witnessed the tragic scene. In old days, it is said, the actual crucifixion was not uncommon among Penitentes, but was supposed to have been abandoned long ago, though the practice of self torture is still carried out among the members of the order during holy week.

A NEW TRIBE OF REDMEN

Saturday evening there was organized in this city a tribe of Redmen, the work being accomplished under the direction of Mr M Irwin, and it is now in good working order with a large membership. Formerly there was a tribe of the Redmen at this place, but some time back the charter was given up. Nearly all of the members of the old tribe have joined the new organization, and a great deal of new material has been added. The lodge is known as the Yellow Hawk Tribe of Redmen. At the meeting Saturday night, the following officers were elected: T O Rockwell, Sachem; J F Murphy, Senior Sagamore; G L Diggers, Junior Sagamore; F R Brown, Prophet; M H Kirtley, Keeper of Wampum; J E Gilham, Chief of Records; J W White, M D Giffin and Joseph McCreary, Trustees; W E Kinzie, E M Hall and G W Donnelly, Auditing Committee.

Past Formosa

St Petersburg April 21—The ministry of finance has received a telegram from a confidential agent at Shanghai giving a rumor that Vice Admiral Rojstvensky has already passed the straits of Formosa without encountering Vice Admiral Togo.

MOROS ATTACK

WALLED CITY

Manilla April 24—The walled city of Jolo was attacked by the Moros on April 9th. They fired into the officers' club and dispersed those present at a dance which was in progress at the time. On April 10th, the secretary of Governor Scott was ambushed and killed within the range of the sentries. Datto, a refugee from Barneo, has organized the Moros, who are defying the Americans. General Wood has arrived in Jolo and has given the Moros ten days to surrender the refugees, Datto, otherwise he will concentrate a sufficient force to secure the compliance with his demand.

Bloodthirsty Children

Fresno, Cal., April 24.—Two children are in jail charged with battery, having hammered another child and a baby with a piece of brick until they were senseless at Sanger Saturday morning. The infant criminals are Little McKane, aged 6 years, and her brother Orville, aged 5 years. Their victims are Lloyd Glass, aged 18 months, and Nellie Chase, aged 6 years. Little and Orville attacked Lloyd and Nellie because Nellie made faces at them. Neither of the victims are yet conscious and may die. The McKane children will be taken to the Whittier reform school.

Section Hands Killed

The total snowfall Thursday in southeastern Wyoming and western Nebraska was 15 inches. Telegraph service both east and west is still crippled. Two Japanese section hands blinded by the snowstorm, were run down and killed near Bushnell, Neb.
