for gas and electric light was favorably

called out to keep the crowd in check.

it was struck by an Eighth avenue trol-
ler car, and that he temporarily lost
control of the brakes. The big auto-
mobile plunged across the big sidewalk
and into the fence with great force.

Berkeley Cal April 25.—Dr Gideon A.
Weed died here yesterday at the age
of 72 years. He resided in Nevada
and in Washington when those states
were admitted into the union. He or-
ganized the state medical board of
Washington and for 10 years was a re-
gent of the university of that state.
He was mayor of Seattle for two terms
serving from 1875 to 1879 and took a
leading part in suppressing the anti-
Chinese riots there.

Strike is Renewed

threatens to become a general lockout
or a general strike. The final decision
will be reached in a conference which
