TWO KILLED IN A CALIFORNIA FEUD

Bakersfield Cal., April 26.—A feud
between two well-known mountain
families, the Walkers and Burtons,
and extending over a period of two
decades, broke out again in the min-
ing town of Havilah at 2 o'clock yes-
terday afternoon when Newt Walker
and Dave Burton fought a pistol duel
in the street, resulting in the instant
death of Burton and his companion,
a man named Bagby. Ten or a dozen
shots were fired before Burton fell and
Walker, after reloading his pistol, made
his escape and is now hiding in the
mountain fastnesses.

This is the third of the Burton boys
to die violent deaths. Fletcher Bur-
ton was killed by Ben Walker in 1891,
and Walker is still fugitive from jus-
tice. The Gibson brothers were con-
victed as accessories to the crime and
sentenced to life imprisonment, but
were subsequently pardoned. Jim
Burton was shot down on the same
night that Fletcher was killed, but he
recovered only to meet death a year
later at the hands of O. H. Allison, a
partisan of the Gibsons. Allison was
subsequently acquitted.

There is but one of the Burton
brothers alive now, Luther by name,
a prominent mining man of Tonopah.
He has been notified of his brother's
death.

Only last week, Phil Walker, the
youngest member of the Walker fam-
ily, pleaded guilty to murdering an
old man by the name of Nicoll, and
was sentenced to life imprisonment.

he may have been murdered. A re-
volver was found lying by his bed, and
every cartridge was discharged. Felson
came here from Montana, and it is
said he had mines in Colorado.

TESTIMONY ENDS IN BUNKERS CASE

Sacramento, April 26.—All the evi-
dence in the Bunkers' bribery case is
now before the jury, except that of a
few witnesses to rebut the attacks on
the character of detective Hartling for
truth and veracity. Hartling testified
for the prosecution, and was one of the
strongest witnesses. The arguments
in the case will begin tomorrow.

TAX COLLECTOR IS DEFAULTER

San Francisco April 26.—Mayor
Schmidt announced today that the tax
collector, Edward Smith, was a de-
faulter to the amount of five thousand
dollars, and asked that the police ap-
prehend him. Smith left the city last
Thursday, saying that he was going to
Los Angeles. He has not been heard
from since.

TO OBSERVE MAY DAY

Warsaw April 26.—The social demo-
cratic leaders of the Lithuania have is-
sued a manifesto to workmen and peas-
ant laborers requesting them not to
work on May 1st, as a protest against
the existing conditions. The manifesto
concludes with the hope that this will
be the last May Day under despotic
government. The holidays passed off
quietly. The garrison has been heavily
reinforced.
