General News

President Roosevelt and party will
be in Chicago May 17

Three provinces of western Morocco
are in full rebellion, and a wholesale
massacre of Jews and Christians is
feared.

By Cape Horn the distance between
New York and San Francisco is about
14,800 miles. The Panama canal will
reduce this to something less than
5000

At Havre Mont, a Chinese gambler
named Toy, accused of the murder of
Lizzie Booth, was discharged from
custody, there being no evidence
against him. The Booth girl was a
white prostitute.

Calvin D. Maus and James Burgess,
two merchants from Creston, Iowa,
were attacked and severely beaten by
four men alleged to be watchmen for
strike breakers, in a restaurant on
Van Buren street Chicago.

For the first time in the history of
the state of Mississippi a negro accus-
ed of assault on a white woman has
been acquitted. The defendant was
Stewart Jewell and on the advice of
the presiding judge he left town and
probably the state, at once.

A contract has been let for building
a Catholic cathedral at Seattle to cost
\$164,902. The building must be finish-
ed within 18 months. The cathedral
will occupy a block on one of the most
commanding sites in Seattle. The site
was purchased for \$65,000 about a year
ago.

Northwest News

Nes Perce, Idaho, will soon be out
of debt entirely and have nearly \$1000
in the city treasury to the good.

The secretary of state at Olympia,
announces that there are \$47,000 peo-
ple in Washington of which Seattle
has 154,000.

Advices from Alaska from various
points give the following estimates of
winter clean-up: Dawson between \$10,
000,000 and \$12,000,000; Fairbanks
\$3,000,000; Nome \$3,000,000.

At Astoria, John Matthe, aged two
years, secured some matches and set
his clothes on fire. Before he was dis-
covered and the flames extinguished,
he was so badly burned that he died
three hours later.

Chinook salmon are now running in
large numbers in Fraser river, British
Columbia. This might not seem to be
reversing special mention but as a
matter of fact chinook salmon were
never seen in the Fraser river until
his spring.

Fred Belle, aged 15 years, is a trusty
in the Multnomah county jail. Fifteen
prisoners had planned and were ex-
ecuting an escape when Belle "caught
on." One man escaped, but Belle held
the other 14 at bay with a revolver un-
til the guards came and all were re-
turned to their cells.

Try Turbine Engines

Washington April 26—The recom-
mendations which the naval board of
construction have made to the secre-
tary of the navy for the construction
of three scout cruisers—Chester, Salem
and Birmingham—contemplate that
the Fore River Shipbuilding company
build one of the vessels, equipped with
reciprocating engines, and another
with turbine engines, the Bath Iron
works of Bath, Me., to build the third
with a different type of turbine en-
gine. These companies were the lowest
bidders. The turbine engine will be
something entirely new to the Ameri-
can navy and will be given its first
trial in a United States man-of-war
when installed in the scouts which are
required to make a maximum speed
of 24 knots.

Receiver Asked For

Butte Mont., April 26—A Helena
special to the Miner says: The Jeff-
erson Valley Trading company, one of
the oldest companies in the state
operating at Whitehall and other
points in Jefferson county, has been
ordered to appear before Judge Wm H
Hunt of the United States court May
1, and show cause why an injunction
should not issue and a receiver be ap-
pointed for the concern as prayed in
the petition filed by John E. Davies.
It is alleged that William F. Fergus,
acting treasurer and general manager
of the company, has been guilty of
negligence and mismanagement of the
company's affairs; that he has been
engaged in the promotion of the South
Boulder Mining company, and as a
manager of the trading company has
extended credit to the mining com-
pany, paying its payroll, etc., to the
amount of \$24,000

Eight hundred linear feet of ditch to
be dug from a point at the intersection
of Harding street with Fourth street
to the northeast corner of X street.

Fifteen hundred and sixty five feet
of ditch to be dug from a point at the
intersection of Osburn and Greenwood
streets to a point one block east to the
intersection of Valley street, thence
north two blocks to Valley street and
thence west two blocks to North Fir
street.

Twelve hundred and fifty feet of
ditch to be dug from a point at the
intersection of Osburn street and North
Fir street north to Trowbridge street,
thence east one block to intersection
of Trowbridge and North Greenwood
streets.

Five hundred and ten feet of ditch
to be dug from a point at the inter-
section of North Greenwood street and
B streets south to the intersection of
Monroe avenue.

Three hundred and sixty nine feet
of ditch to be dug from a point at the
intersection of O and Eighth street and
running west one block to intersection
of seventh and U street.

Eighteen hundred feet of ditch to be
dug from a point at the intersection
of Adams avenue and Spruce street
west to a point eighteen hundred feet
from place of beginning.

one half feet deep and one and one-half
feet wide, all street crossings to be
left closed subject to orders of water
superintendent. Said ditch to be filled
subject to the orders of the Water
Dept. Said work to be completed on
