MOVEMENTS OF THE RALEIGH

Washington, April 25.—The cruiser Raleigh, which some days ago sailed from Labuan, Borneo, for the Cagay Islands in the Philippines, has arrived at Cavite, according to a cable report to the navy department. It was assumed here that the Raleigh's captain had reason to believe that some of the hostile fleets might enter the Philippine waters in the vicinity of the Cagay Islands.

The navy department is advised that the gunboat Villalobos has sailed from Shanghai for a cruise. While it is not stated in what direction the vessel has gone, it is believed that her mission is to observe the movements of hostile fleets in the event they might turn toward Philippine waters.

EASTER MONEY WAS PLENTIFUL

New York April 26—Easter contributions to the churches of this city are estimated to have considerably exceeded \$250,000. Indeed, the sum total of the seven or eight churches closed as the wealthier congregations probably reached that figure. In some instances the gifts were as large as \$25,000 from individuals. Grace church received one contribution of that sum which will be used for the training schools for deaconesses. Altogether the congregational offering was \$55,450 the largest in many years.

St Andrew's, in Harlem, received \$30,000, the largest amount ever offered by that congregation. Like Grace church, the plates received one check for \$25,000. Old Trinity is thought to have raised \$60,000 for the numerous institutions under its patronage.

In Brooklyn heavy offerings were reported and several churches will be enabled to wipe out their entire indebtedness.

Big Damage Suit

Tacoma, Wash., April 26.—One of the largest damage suits ever brought to trial in Pierce county is being tried before Judge Chapman. Edwin J. Brown of Seattle is suing the state board of dental examinations for \$50,000 for unlawfully withholding from him a state license. Brown, who is what is known as an "advertising dentist," alleges that the board treated him unfairly in his examination and that the questions were "silly, unknown to science and obsolete."

He further charges that the members of the board entered into a conspiracy with the state dental society and national dental association in an effort to drive him from the state.
